the Agro Studies training in

Israel since 2013.
Out of these, 10 are working with the agriculture ministry as inspectors in the export market sector and the rest are involved in individual businesses, with some pooling resources to work as business entrepreneurs.

Mrs. Museveni and her guest agreed that setting up a demonstration farm will help graduates of the Israel Agro Studies practise the skills and knowledge they acquired during their training.

Currently, 250 students are undergoing an 11-month hands-on training at the Agro Studies Training Centre in Israel

The training will expose them to modern farming methods in horticulture, greenhouse, crop and animal

agriculture.

The students also go through a social attitude and mindset transformation and come out ready to become youth cadres of agricultural transformation and transformation and job-creation through commercial agriculture production, agroprocessing and innovations.
