The Government has urged universities to strengthen quality assurance mechanism that match international standards if they are to remain globally competitive.

The call was made by the state minister for higher education, Dr Chrysostom Muyingo, in a speech read by the commissioner of higher education, Timothy Ssejjoba.

This was during the 12th graduation ceremony of ISBAT University at Hotel Africana in Kampala on Thursday.

"I call upon universities and other institutions of learning to strengthen their quality assurance systems by establishing functional directorates of quality assurance, as well as adhering to set standards and adopting best international practices," Muyingo said.

He encouraged other stakeholders to remain vigilant to ensure that quality standards are maintained in higher institutions of learning as they continue to provide the muchneeded human capital required by the country's growing economy.

He emphasised that the National Council for Higher Education(NCHE) will continue to be strengthened in order to effectively and efficiently perform its mandate conferred by the Universities and other Tertiary Institutions Act.

He told guests that the Government is committed to transforming the country into a knowledge-based economy, where creation, adaption and use of knowledge are critical factors for economic growth and development.
